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## “THE POTTERS.”

STOKE, like Luton, is a historic name in football. The club from one of The Five Towns in that thickly populated part of Staffordshire, known as The Potteries, has been in Division I. and II. of the League and Division I. and II. of the Southern League. Stoke came into the present division through being bottom of the table last season, having 24 points as compared with the 27 of Brentford, their companions in “the fall.”

Up to the present Stoke have won 18 of their Southern League games, drawn 2 and lost 5. One of the drawn games was at home with Croydon in the first match of the season, when two goals were shared, but the next, when at Croydon, the Robins beat the Potters by 2—0. After that, Stoke away beat Mid-Rhondda 2—0, and Ton Pentre 2—1. At home they defeated Abertillery 3—0, away Treharris 5—0, home Llanelly 2—1 and Treharris 5—1, away Swansea 3—2, home Barry 7—1, and away Aberdare 4—2. Then came, on December 6th, Stoke's second defeat. They visited Newport and—like Brentford last Saturday and Luton on Xmas Day—got defeated, the score being 3—2 against Stoke. Afterwards the Potters beat Caerphilly 5—1 and 4—0, and Aberdare 4—1. At Brentford, Stoke were beaten by two goals to nil. They then at home beat Ton Pentre and Mid-Rhondda 2—0 and 1—0 respectively, but the following week they suffered the great indignity of losing at Abertillery by the only goal of the match. Stoke had two home games in succession and beat Brentford 2—1 and Pontypridd 5—1. On March 17th Stoke lost 2—0 at Llanelly and the same week drew 1—1 at Barry. They won 2—0 at home against Newport and last Saturday won 2—1 at Mardy.
